My beloved community:

Our Board has been busy this month! After the February 11th workshop with UUA support person Evin Carvill-Ziemer we spent a good amount of time collating all the wonderful suggestions and input from all of you. Evin really made the congregation think about our priorities, and had us thinking outside the box! After reading, sifting, thinking, collating, analyzing all that, and looking at it all from 30,000 feet, the Board sees a few trends:

1) Overwhelmingly people want to keep our building

2) People are willing to see a reduction in our Minister's position

3) An increase in RE staff, and office staff

We want to thank all of you for your input, as it really helps the Board work in a direction we all can agree on. Evin will continue to help us with navigating our upcoming changes, and with the UUA support we feel confident that although the road before us is a hard one, we will meet and grow beyond our challenges. We have also agreed on an evaluation format for conducting a Congregational Assessment. A team is being put together by Susie Ericson-West and that team will meet and complete the evaluation by the April board meeting! We are excited to work on our future!

We are still looking for people interested in being on a Property Committee, not that they need to actually fix the toilets, or the alarm, or a leaky roof, but rather create a team to do some identification of needs and services and develop a plan on how things will be managed to help us keep the building in its best condition.

We are grateful to Carl Jacobs and Eloise Clark for their continued work on funding opportunities for larger projects needing attention.

Ongoing items are putting together a Personnel Committee, a Communications Committee, and putting an Ombudsman Team together.


Slice of Fellowship

Historic Highlights of KUUC by Eloise Clark

Many of us UUs' have a deep connection with nature. We love being outdoors and feel nourished from the experience. In honor of Earth Day this month, let's take a look at some Keene Unitarians whose love of the outdoors has benefitted the entire city for many generations and even in current times. In 1886, our indomitable Miss Mary B. Dinsmoor along with four others "drew up the by-laws and articles of association for the Rural Improvement Society." She and fellow church members George A. Wheelock and Caroline Ingersoll were the Society's most enthusiastic members according to Jim Smart's *The Keene Unitarian Universalist Church: its building and its people*. George Wheelock had been a long time member of the earlier Forest Tree Society. Their mission was to plant trees along Keene's byways and in Central Square.

When one looks at our wooded hillsides, it's difficult to imagine a landscape devoid of trees. But for over 150 years, trees had been used for construction, fuel, potash and cooking. The Great Sheep Boom from 1810-40 had cleared much of the land for agriculture. Founding members of the Rural Improvement Society saw the results and realized the need for protecting forestland. "The impending sale of sizable lots of good timberland prompted some concerned people to take action." George Wheelock bought 25 acres of land in 1866 in West Keene, creating a park that bears his name. In 1896 and 1897, he bought two tracts totaling 100 acres above the reservoir on Beech Hill, our Robin Hood Park. Caroline Ingersoll bought a 17-acre tract of land across Park Avenue from Wheelock Park in 1887. She christened it Ladies Wildwood Park. And Dinsmoor Woods on Maple Avenue was created on 13 acres purchased by Miss Mary B. in 1923.

Interest in land conservation has continued through the 20th century and into the 21st with the creation and expansion of City owned lands. Many current congregation members have served on the Keene Conservation Commission through the years. They have helped ensure that proper stewardship of natural resources continues in Keene.

Currently, if you've enjoyed hiking the improved trail around Goose Pond with its new walkways and signs, thank Tom Haynes, our head usher. As Chair of the Goose Pond Forest Stewardship Committee and Conservation Commission member, he has helped "usher" those changes for the betterment of both the environment and the public. The spirit of service pulses strongly in many of us UU's. Happy Earth Day!
