Worship Calendar

[Our Soul Matters theme for September is "Deep Listening". Ask yourself: Are we a people who practice & value deep listening? How has, (or does, or will), deep listening impact(ed) my life? Career? Marriage? Etc.]

October 4th: "Make It Work" (Rev. Michael)

This morning's service is part of our collective effort to see, as President-Elect Carl Jacobs often says, "work as worship," within our congregational life. Your time is valuable, and using a portion of it to help clean, repair and maintain our buildings and grounds is not just a money-saving measure, or way to get to know folks, or "to give to the church," (though it is all those things), but an important way to embody your values.

October 11th: "Coming Out as Ourselves" (Rev. Michael)

Today is a special day. "National Coming Out Day," a yearly commemoration begun in 1988, is grounded in the experience of members of the LGBT+ community "coming out," to family and friends. Coming out is the beginning of a personal, public and spiritual journey: because living joyfully, courageously and fully into their truth is still not without peril. Today we will celebrate our Joys and Concerns with each other.

October 18th: "The Power of Saying Yes: My Journey to Teotihuacan" (Rachael Walter)

Teotihuacan is an ancient Mesoamerican city in Mexico, that was home to a group of people called the Toltecs. They were scholars, scientists, artists and healers. The moment Rachael said "YES!" to traveling to Teotihuacan, her life started to change. Spirit is an amazing force! Join Rachael as she revisits her summer service, adds some new information, and ponders this October's Soul Matters Theme – Deep Listening.

October 25th: "Listening to the Tradition Unfolding" (Rev. Michael)

As in past years, today we will toll the church bell to remember the lives of those dearly departed members, friends and heroes of the congregation. We will also examine and celebrate our "living tradition," of religious sources and spiritual ancestors, which, like a river, continues to take in new sources of inspiration and strength as it rises to meet this new day.

- Words and deeds of prophetic people, which challenge us to confront powers and structures of
 evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions, which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings, which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings, which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions, which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

What I am most grateful for is the dedication we all share to creating the best possible worship, the humility that comes with acknowledging limitations while learning new ways of working together and unfamiliar tools with which to become proficient as we produced each service. All along the way we have tried to challenge ourselves with new and different goals each and every week.

Donna, Jill, Susie, David, Carl and the many others who have sat in, or set up, written new worship material, or lent their voices in song—to create a new thing—did so just for you! We know that everyone wants to be together, that there are sometimes glitches with the platform, the WIFI connection, quality differences between individual computers, and we have worked hard to eliminate them one by one. We continue to work, to improve and to set higher and higher standards because that is what we demand of ourselves and want for you.

We have even begun to reimagine life beyond our current restraints—without strict social distancing and the masks, including hymns that we can sing together and with multi-generation groupings—even though we know that it will be some time yet. However, when talking about those distant we have thought it important to continue recording some portions of those services for people who are unable to attend, and including some of the technology—things like films clips, slideshows and even projected hymn lyrics—that would make our worship more multisensory, inclusive and interesting.

I hope that we all challenge ourselves to embrace different worship styles and the use technology in ways that inspires greater reverence, enhances our collective experience and expands our reach.

The Soul Matters theme for October is *Deep Listening*. We'll turn our attention to listening to our instincts, our conscience, the still small voice that is sometimes wordless, sometimes a feeling, sometimes an unexplainable knowing. From Teresa Honey Youngblood, Family Ministry Coordinator for Soul Matters Sharing Circle:

With deep listening's power in mind, this month we will hone our skills at using intuition, listening to hunches, feelings, and our guts. We will explore ways that people use their faces, bodies, and tones to say more (and sometimes different) than their words. We'll listen for assumptions about others that are vestiges of our cultural conditioning, no longer serving us or the greater good. And we will practice listening for the numinous, the profoundly spiritual presence that some people say is the divine.

- If you are on Facebook, "like" the page for Keene Unitarian Universalist Church. From there I can send you an invitation to a private group for KUUC's RE families. It's easy to post Soul Matters links, gifs, videos, etc, in that group, and it saves me sending you too many emails.
- Look for a packet of information, ideas and activities to arrive during the first full week of the month.
- Sunday, October 4 at 8:00pm, please join me for a 30-45 minute live Zoom for parents and other adults. We'll check in with each other, talk about the theme and activities for the month, and whatever else is coming up for you right now. I'll send the Zoom link via email and will put it in the RE Facebook group and group message.
- Every Wednesday, I'll post one of those Soul Matters links in the Facebook group.

- Sunday, October 11 during the live Zoom worship (which begins at 10am) we'll have a breakout group for the elementary RE kids, either during the service itself or during coffee hour which immediately follows the service.
- Also Sunday, October 11, the RE Committee meets at 4pm via live Zoom. Please contact Jill if you'd like to attend that meeting; all are welcome and I'll gladly send you a link.
- Wednesday, October 21 8:00pm, live Zoom meeting for parents, a conversation about the first episode of the Seeing White podcast. 
