### **JUNE 2021 WORSHIP CALENDAR:**

[Our Soul Matters theme for June is "Play" yours, mine and ours. What are the first things that come to mind when I think about play? Is church a place you feel comfortable playing? How about at Worship? Work? Are you really "all work and no play"? What kind of activities do engage in when at play? Have those activities changed over the years?]

June 6<sup>th</sup>: "Playing Human" (Rev. Michael)

What role does "play", our Soul Matters theme for June, have to do with all our searching for truth and working for justice? Is play something to be left behind once one is considered an adult, altogether avoided as merely a distraction? Or is play the model, means or even the secret ingredient needed to find our way to individual meaning and collective liberation?

June 13<sup>th</sup>: "What's With the Flag, Anyway?" (Rev. Michael)

Have you ever been asked to explain all the rainbow flags at KUUC? What do you say? Perhaps you no longer give it much thought and just say, "We support our LBGT members and neighbors." In the service prior to our Annual Meeting, we will explore the evolution of both the LGBTQAI+ movements and think about what it means to be welcoming and supportive allies.

June20<sup>th</sup>: "Where Are the Flowers?" (Rev. Michael)

It is difficult to think about having to do another virtual Flower Communion knowing that we are getting closer and closer to having in-person worship (with a live stream for folks who are unable to join us). However, we will figure out the details and make Flower Communion, traditionally part of our last service of the "church year" special—no matter what the format.

June 27<sup>th</sup>: "Worship From General Assembly" (Our UUA)

One of the most inspiring aspects of General Assembly is the Sunday morning service, when thousands of Unitarian Universalists pack a huge auditorium—the place just shakes and the people make a joyful noise. Once again, however, General Assembly is not an in-person gathering but a virtual one. But I predict that the Sunday worship is going to rock! Today, KUUC will attend the Sunday worship at GA, and afterward meet for our usual Zoom coffee hour.

What was the first word that came to my mind when I saw that the Soul Matters theme for this mouth was "Play"? Well, I can tell you that it wasn't

boardgames, nor sports not even that magical "two hours traffic" that happens on a stage? The word that came to my mind was "freedom."

Now don't get me wrong, I have enjoyed many a marathon game of Monopoly with my cousins when it was too stormy a day to go to the beach, and years later with family here in Keene. I loved playing sports with the gang in my neighborhood long before I was ever assigned a number and given a uniform to wear on fancy chalk lined fields, under banks of light. I have so many fond memories of each play I ever did; from my singing version of George Washington at the third-grade assembly, right up to playing the Tramp who walked off with Nora Burke in the middle of our dinner theatre a few years back, promising her nothing more than her freedom.

What could be better than a life of freedom?

When I think of play, I think of freedom! I think of the free-ranging play I knew as a child and try to keep alive as an adult. We can all probably remember imagining, inventing and improvising off of what life was revealing to us with each new day. Did you speak new languages that you created with a playmate out of whole cloth? Did you travel to the distant lands you saw in dreams? I believe that children don't horde up everything at play time, (except perhaps a special stuffed animal), they are usually more willing to share the time and collaborate with their playmates then adults often are. They are always paying attention, even when we are not, to what the stirring restlessness of the moment is trying to teach.

When I think of play, I think of ordinary moments being transformed to whatever we fancy, or can create; whatever we imagine that time, place and we could be, they can become, if only for one afternoon in a lifetime of them.

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## KUUC Added to the NH State Register of Historic Places!!

The New Hampshire Department of Natural and Cultural Resources announced the inclusion of our venerable church building to the N. H. State Register of Historic Places on May 3<sup>rd</sup>. The building was recognized for its unique architectural styles: the original 1894 sanctuary and parish hall, designed by Edwin James Lewis and the 1959 Religious Education wing designed by Arthur M. Doyle.

The Roxbury Granite Company under the supervision of Myron T. Cass built the sanctuary and parish hall over the summer of 1894. The church's Gothic Revival exterior walls and bell tower harmonize with the Tudor-style stucco gable ends and diamond-paned leaded glass windows. The RE wing, designed in a 1960 contemporary style, incorporates Kalwall, a prefabricated exterior material still made in Manchester, NH.

Edwin James Lewis was a prominent Boston architect of his day. He was also a dedicated Unitarian who designed two-dozen other Unitarian churches. Two of the buildings he designed are on the National Register of Historic Places: a shingle style church in Houlton, Maine and the Dearborn School in Roxbury, MA.

Lewis favored using local materials in his designs, hence the granite was quarried in Roxbury for the foundation and exterior walls. The green slate roof came from a Vermont quarry. However, the beams, trusses and interior woodwork are of southern yellow pine. The bell tower houses the 1500-pound Revere bell that followed the congregation from its original church (1829) on the corner of Church and Main Streets. Mr. Lewis chose the golden cock for our weathervane.

Our church received the NH State recognition for its exterior elements alone. We always knew we had a gem! The committee also deemed the building eligible for consideration for the National Register of Historic Places given its interior design. The National Register is a different and lengthier process I will pursue at a later date. In addition to signifying historical importance, inclusion on this register can qualify us for state assistance for preservation work on the building.

I could not have succeeded in this labor of love without the invaluable help of Jim Smart's <u>The Keene Unitarian Universalist Church</u>: the building and its people, which he published in 1996. It is a fascinating narrative of congregational history and its buildings. UU's have been woven into the fabric of life in Keene through charitable work, aka community outreach, since 1824. Watch for more historic snippets in the months ahead.

Their words brought comfort and inspiration to a country worried about the Cold War, McCarthyism, and racial division.
