October 3rd: "Bullies & Boundaries" (Rev. Michael)

Sometimes the world seems like a giant playground with all of its rivals and bullies, innocents and idealists, peacekeepers and powerbrokers. Sometimes it feels enormous, random and indecipherable. How does how we view "the world" shape how we relate to everything else? Join us on YouTube for the service.

October 10th: "Coming In, Coming Home" (Rev. Michael)

Today we return to the dual platform (in-person & livestreamed through YouTube) delivery of worship. As we come home to our Sanctuary for worship once again, we will explore the sense of comfort or discomfort we feel in the places we grew up and with people we knew/know best.

October 17th: "Relatable" (Rev. Michael)

Interpersonal relations are hard enough between people who agree on most issues, even when they are face-to-face, with all the time in the world to sort out any disagreements that arise between them and find common ground. But really, how often are people who have to (or want to) get along so much alike, and find themselves in the ideal setting to relate, understand and accept each other as is?

October 31th: "The Thin Time" (Rev. Michael)

We find ourselves at a time in the year where people from different cultures celebrate the people that they have lost: from their parish, family or tribe. Some gather at gravesides to visit ancestors and celebrate with them; others seek the wisdom or presence of ancestors through mediums and special objects belonging to the one we loved. SHARING MINISTRY OCTOBER 2021

"Many people suffer from the fear of finding oneself alone, and so they don't find themselves at all."

— Rollo May, Man's Search for Himself."

Over the many months that we have been at least in semi-seclusion, I have been worried about how you all were dealing with all that alone time. Time alone can indeed be a blessing or it can be quite a challenge. It is blessing when we embrace it as an opportunity to get reacquainted with who we are, as we are, right now. If we take that time and invest a generous portion of it into spiritual practices---which run the gamut from silence, to chanting, holistic exercise such as yoga or immersing ourselves in Nature---we should do just fine. When we set time aside to simply be, and dedicate ourselves to cultivating the great spaciousness within, we come closer to realizing the presence of whatever we think the *holy* to be. Through spiritual practice, we come to see how often we ignore our greatest need---to be fully present to our own unfolding and alive in the wonder of being human. Yet, if we continue on, the change will be remarkable; because we will be comfortable in our own being, we will always be in good company, when we are alone, or with strangers and dear friends alike.

It is also a great blessing to have time to be with loved ones, to finally do that very challenging 3-D jigsaw puzzle that you got for Christmas back in 2007, to tackle a house project or teach yourself how to speak Danish---but beware. The path of useful activity can easily become a detour to the wandering way of distraction; or perhaps it never was really useful activity at all. We tend to use busyness to willfully avoid the opportunity to deepen presented by time alone.

To enjoy solitude means to show up for ourselves, to listen to our breath, body and heartbeat. It means to embrace, understand, authorize and learn to love ourselves---even our deepest fears, doubts, sorrows or shame. Solitude is an opening to self, spirit and our full humanity. Unlike loneliness, which is a shutting off, a closing down, a feeling of separation, solitude is a way of opening: of building spiritual resilience, of feeling at peace with oneself and at home in the world.

HISTORIC HIGHLIGHTS OF KUUC: OCTOBER

Have you had the adventure of venturing to KUUC's version of "New Jersey"? It's technically the basement underneath the sanctuary of the church, but New Jersey is a much more colorful name. Does anyone know the history of its naming?

The basement is a marvel of engineering. It reflects the architect Edwin James Lewis thorough approach to the building craft. The plans for the sanctuary called for it to support 600 people. To achieve this goal, pillars of bricks measuring 16" by 16" were built up from the floor, some fifteen feet in from the exterior walls. Upon these, iron I-beams were bolted together. These repurposed railroad tracks stretch the 97-foot length of the building.

Floor joists were placed at 12" intervals from the exterior walls to the I-beams. In today's building projects, joists are placed at 16" intervals. Furthermore, each joist has additional bracing. The joists were covered by one-inch fir subflooring, upon which the finished flooring was laid. After 55 years of wear and tear, the flooring was showing signs of its hard use. In 1949, the gray linoleum tiles one sees today were installed. It happened over a three-week period that summer.

Should you have a chance to travel to KUUC's New Jersey, look up and study the sturdy construction that's overhead. Take a moment to admire this floor that has reliably supported the soles of the many souls who have come through our doors over 127 years.

IN-PERSON WORSHIP RETURNS ON 10-10-21: WILL YOU BE THERE TOO?

On Sunday, October 10th, we will return to full "Dual-Platform Worship" delivery which means that for the first time since the August 15th the live worship will include KUUC members and friends in the pews and that happy occasion will also be streamed out those members, friends and worship prospectors wherever they may be watching on YouTube.

Do you hope to join us in the Sanctuary on an upcoming Sunday? All you have to do to be put on our attendance list is send a photo of your vaccination card to Rev. Michael at rev.michaelkuuc1824@gmail.com. The photo must clearly show your name and the dates on which you received your shots. There are some other limitations that need to be observed:

- Masks must be worn by attendees at all times during the service except for the Worship Team when they are speaking, singing or playing music.
- There will 6' spacing between individuals unless they are part of a family or pod.
- Some rows will be taped off to insure that appropriate spacing exist forward to back as well as side-by-side.
- For the foreseeable future there will be no congregational singing, though hymns will be played and sung by soloists.
- We cannot allow people to remain in the Sanctuary after the service to gather together and talk.

Hopefully reason and the common good will prevail in our country once again and public safety will be a priority for all. When that day comes, and the rates of infection drop, we will be able to worship just as we did prior to when the COVID pandemic began.

EXPLORE SPIRITUAL TOPICS WHILE GETTING TO KNOW SOMEONE FROM KUUC!!

Have you experienced a Covenant Group at KUUC? If you have, you can appreciate the deeper connections you have made with your small group members. If you have not, we hope to give you a sense of what goes on in a small group by matching pairs of KUUC members/friends for a monthly phone call with a topic for discussion. Topics will come from the UUA Soul Matters curriculum or may be suggested by Rev. Michael or KUUC members. The majority of those who participated in Duos from March through June this year gave very positive feedback. The four topics were IDENTITY, INTERCONNECTEDNESS, WAKING UP WHITE, and THIS I BELIEVE. Past participants will be matched with a different participant this time around. Interested? Read on!

Duos will last for 3 months initially, one phone call per month. (We are still hoping to be able to return to in person worship, at which time you may continue on with your Duo calls or opt out.) Participants will receive an email with the monthly discussion topic and some quotes and/ or readings. (Those without internet will be snail mailed).

GROUND RULES FOR COVENANT DUOS:

Active Listening is key. No cross talk during check-in or initial response to the topic. After both have had a chance to speak on the topic, cross talk/discussion may occur. Always speak from your own experience. Respond respectfully. Please do not attempt to 'fix' or offer advice (unless specifically requested to do so). Confidentiality is expected.

There will be a 45 minute time limit. Please feel free to write up/ agree with your 'match' on elements of your own covenant and how you want to experience this time. i.e. You may want to set a time limit for initial topic discussion, etc.
