WORSHIP CALENDAR FOR NOVEMBER 2021

[Our theme for November is "Holding History" or simply "History." You might ask yourself: How do we hold our history? Is History something that we share? Is it something that unites us all or something that divides people into categories based on race, gender and economic status? Is it simply what happened before this moment or is it a tool for putting a narrative to the otherwise chaotic passage of time?]

November 7th: "Relatable" (Rev. Michael F. Hall) Interpersonal relations are hard enough between people who agree on most issues, even when they are face-to-face, with all the time in the world to sort out any disagreements that arise between them and find common ground. But how often do those ideal conditions exist?

November 14th: "There is Some History Here" (Rev. Michael) It may be hard to believe, in this day and age, but there are many reasons why people on both sides of the political divide just don't trust the government, the medical establishment, the liberals, the police and their employers. There's a history there.

November 21st: "Harmful History" (Rev. Michael) As we approach the fourth Thursday in November, we come to head on to one of the most persistent stories about America's "origins" --- that of the "First Thanksgiving." What do we do when the common narratives of our history are presented in misleading, exclusive or downright odious ways?

November 28th: "Playful Diversions" (Rev. Michael) As we begin to swing toward the snow season, we also change the games we play and the ways we amuse ourselves. Today, we take a look at the playful diversions of life: sport, games, handicrafts and playful diversions that have kept us keeping on over the centuries.

HISTORIC HIGHLIGHTS: NOVEMBER '21

Now that we have the opportunity to return to the sanctuary for our services, take a moment to look upward and admire the view. The rafters that support the roof measure 24 feet long, six inches thick and are set at 28-inch intervals. They are made of southern yellow pine. Spanning the sanctuary are immense horizontal trusses. They are 34 feet long, 18 inches high and six inches thick. All the roof pieces have chamfered edges to soften the angles. Painters spread a thin stain on the wood ceiling.

Notice the curved arch supports that hold the trusses on the sidewalls. One-inch-thick bolts hold the curved arch supports together. Three-inch square decorative washers and two-inch square nuts cap them. Seven were used in each of the twelve arches. Architect Edwin James Lewis insisted on precision to the point that every square washer holding the bolts of the roof trusses had to be perfectly aligned with one another. In the Parish Hall, the trusses were pitched at a lesser angle than the roof beams. Mr. Lewis felt this was a better design for smaller sanctuaries.

The exterior roof is visually stunning. The steep pitch is covered in green slate quarried in Vermont. Most unusual is the treatment of each dormer. Each is covered with slate, even the rounded arches framing the square diamond paned windows. Most remarkably, the work of building the foundation, the exterior walls and all the roof pieces was completed in just two months over the summer of 1894!

As you sit under this soaring roof, let your mind reflect on the many skilled sawyers and carpenters who cut and assembled the beams and trusses overhead. While they are gone, the roof has endured. Then imagine all the words, thoughts and prayers that have been uttered and the ceremonies witnessed under the sanctuary of this marvelous, soaring roof. ---Eloise Clark

JOIN US FOR WORSHIP: IN-PERSON OR ON YOUTUBE

On October 10th we returned once again to the full use of our dual-platform presentation of worship: some people are coming to worship in the Sanctuary and others are enjoying the live stream of the services on YouTube.

Do you hope to join us in the Sanctuary on an upcoming Sunday? All you have to do to be put on our attendance list is send a photo of your vaccination card to Rev. Michael at rev.michaelkuuc1824@gmail.com. The photo must clearly show your name and the dates on which you received your shots. There are some other limitations that need to be observed:

- Masks must be worn by attendees at all times during the service except for the Worship Team when they are speaking, singing or playing music.
- There will 6' spacing between individuals unless they are part of a family or pod.
- Some rows will be taped off to ensure that appropriate spacing exists forward to back as well as side-by-side.
- For the foreseeable future there will be no congregational singing, though hymns will be played and sung by soloists with attendees humming along to these cherished songs.
- We cannot allow people to remain in the Sanctuary after the service to gather together and talk.

Hopefully reason and the common good will prevail in our country once again and public safety will be a priority for all. When that day comes, and the rates of infection drop, we will be able to worship just as we did prior to when the COVID pandemic began.
