THE SIX SOURCES OF OUR LIVING TRADITION

As religious pluralists we draw upon multiple sources of inspiration in worship and daily life including:

Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces that create and uphold life;

Words and deeds of prophetic people, which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;

Wisdom from the world's religions, which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;

Jewish and Christian teachings, which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;

Humanist teachings, which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;

Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions, which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

Good People---

How many of us have, at some point in our lives, felt unwanted or unwelcome in this world? How many of us have been made to feel like outcasts, whether it was in our families of origin, at school, work, or in the society at large?

I would imagine that some of us have felt the painful sting of being shut out from a promotion or equal pay due to our gender. Some of us may have had to struggle for the "right" to love or marry the person we have chosen to spend our lives because we were the same gender. Yet, most of us have been born with privilege, due to our race (physical characteristics), ethnicity (cultural and linguistic connections), nationality (legal citizen status) or class (economic, educational and social standing). Because of our privilege we have been spared some of the worst mistreatment imposed by our society, including constant feelings of alienation or invisibility.

As we enter this month of welcome, try not to think only about "who isn't here anymore," but who isn't represented, and therefore unlikely to be comfortable within our congregational community? Who isn't here anymore may simply be a personal choice based on many things, including the liberal person's seeming discomfort with, ambivalence toward, and even rejection of the commitments represented by "religion" and "church." By and large, their need for our community simply isn't as great as our desire to have them among us. Sadly, the liberal religious stance has so often been distorted into being more about individual choice than collective deliverance.

Perhaps instead our goal should be to build a principle-based community where all sorts of beautiful people---including, but not limited to, those from the working-class, people of color, LGBTQ communities, neurodivergent folks, young people and families---are not only welcomed, but really *feel* welcome.

Because all of us want to thrive, to feel comfortable being who we are, not just what our demographic represents to others. All of us want to have our needs met and values recognized. All of us want to feel that we are central to our congregational/community's mission and purpose in the world.

Therefore, I think that the goal, as concerns our way of welcome and church building, should be the same. As activist Chris Crass wrote we should endeavor "to build and be part of beloved community, united to end structural oppression and unleash collective liberation."


KUUC Retreat Invitation: SECOND CALL "Community as Church/Church as Community"
