## THE SEVEN UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST PRINCIPLES

Our Seven UU Principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a covenant made between our Unitarian Universalist congregations around the world. Many of our members use "The Principles" as a guide for how they choose to live their faith at home and in their communities.

1st Principle:	The inherent worth and dignity of every person
2nd Principle:	Justice, equity and compassion in human relations
3rd Principle:	Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations
4th Principle:	A free and responsible search for truth and meaning
5th Principle:	The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large
6th Principle:	The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all
7th Principle:	Respect for the interdependent web of existence of which we are a part

## THE SIX SOURCES OF OUR LIVING TRADITION

As religious pluralists we draw upon multiple sources of inspiration in worship and daily life including:

Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces that create and uphold life;

Words and deeds of prophetic people, which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;

Wisdom from the world's religions, which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;

Jewish and Christian teachings, which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;

Humanist teachings, which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;

Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions, which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

## REV. MICHAEL'S MOMENT:

"You don't stumble upon your heritage. It's there, just waiting to be explored and shared." ---Robbie Robertson

I find the Soul Matters theme for each month interesting and useful in many ways. It provides me with a centering idea that I can use in my own daily spiritual practices. I also use it to ground some, if not all, of our worship, and as part of other messaging---say in Facebook post – in a given month. Also, the monthly Soul Matters "packet," that is part of our subscription, contains more than just the theme of the month: it includes readings, children's stories, "sermon seeds, "and music links too. Sometimes, it is the other items highlighted in the packet that also prove to be helpful points of departure: particularly the reminders about holidays from other cultures and holy days from different religious traditions and the list of important dates in UU history that happened during the month. This useful compendium has quotes & other information, *things that used to take up a lot of my time* prior to planning and writing individual worship services. Although each monthly packet has a lot of content and ideas, I don't consider myself bound to use all of it or even the theme every week.

One of the things I do with the theme is create a set of questions, based on the theme of the month. Most months it goes at the top of the Worship Calendar, but this month I am putting below [see next paragraph]. The questions are meant to help you and me think about the theme, perhaps to use as a prompt for own meditations, to inspire us to fill a few journal pages or start a conversation with our friends or family.

Our Souls Matters theme for this month can either be framed as "the gift of Heritage," or simply "Heritage. "**Ask yourself:** What impact does my ethnic or cultural heritage have on my family or daily life? What are the most important aspects about Unitarian Universalist heritage that are as alive and important now as they ever were? Are there tenants of our faith that seem dated or tend to get in the way of our individual or collective life progress?

I hope you find truth, meaning and gratification thinking about your heritage, our heritage, in so far as they overlap and the rich heritage of our faith.

## THE BLOCK PROGRAM IS UP AND RUNNING!

Our Block Program is off to an excellent start this year. On September 17<sup>th</sup>, five builders collaborated to construct a city that covered the entire floor of the Block Room. Here is some background information to put it all into context.

Block-building is an essential part of the Religious Exploration Program at KUUC. Our children work with unit blocks, the familiar modular wooden blocks usually seen in early childhood classrooms. In our Program, children from ages three to twelve build structures that are related to their RE experiences, as part of their overall faith development at KUUC.

Our youngest and least experienced builders spend time in open-ended exploration, learning the characteristics of the block collection and how to work with it and with one another. Older and more experienced builders focus on creating specific kinds of structures, and on solving various engineering problems, like how to make stairways, bridges, and taller buildings, for example.

The Block Program provides learning experiences on a number of different levels, all at the same time. First, while they play, children are experimenting with the basic math and science concepts that are inherent in the material itself. Second, they use blocks to explore a range of typical RE topics, such as making temples while they learn about Lunar New Year, or building the cities of Mecca, Medina, and Jerusalem as they learn about the lives of Mohammed and Jesus.

Third, and perhaps most importantly, children put our UU values into action whenever they work with blocks. They are practicing everything we most want them to learn: to respect the work of others, and to collaborate, cooperate, negotiate, compromise, take turns, solve problems, and exercise their creativity. Being responsible for putting the blocks away after building is also a vital part of every session. Lastly, the children *love* to build, and are filled with joy whenever they work in our Block Room.

## KUIUC'S UIUA ANNUAL PROGRAM DRIVE

Our annual campaign to raise money for KUUC's fair share of the UUA's Annual Program Fund Drive begins soon.



The Annual Program Fund is the UUA's primary source of funding. To keep things equitable, every congregation is assessed 6.75% of its previous year's church budget, which, in KUUC's case, is \$11,749. We all desire a strong UUA, one that effectively advocates for liberal, inclusive, non-dogmatic religious thought and one that supports its member congregations.

It's easy to take for granted how much the UUA does for KUUC, but our minister and staff utilize UUA resources regularly. The UUA provides worship materials, music resources, and religious exploration curricula, also information for congregation leaders. The UUA's UU World magazine is available to KUUC members, and the UUA's website (check it out!) are available to everyone. Beyond KUUC's walls, the UUA strengthens our collective voice for justice and love, and it advocates for our values on the national and international stage, including at the United Nations.
