What's New with the Messenger?

Responding to positive feedback from the Board of Trustees & other congregants and staff, we will be moving ahead with some changes to the Messenger starting with this issue.

Will the changes improve the overall usefulness and readability of the Messenger? We believe so, but we would appreciate your feedback on them. Also, as we try to keep up with the ongoing needs our readers and changing demographics within the congregations, we hope to try more adjustments in the coming months as well. We won't hesitate to try other things that we (all) think work better for the many ways that the Messenger is used by the people.

One of the difficulties with making more than cosmetic changes to the Messenger is the different ways it serves us. For many years, the monthly bulletin we know as the Messenger has tried to serve many different needs: it has included monthly columns from elected leaders and staff, articles about upcoming events and new programs and workshops, it has often given space to committees to share who they are and what they do, it has provided "Good Neighbor" community events information, it includes the BOT and staff contact information and many other things.

Because of this, people report using the Messenger differently: Some read it cover-to-cover, some scan it for particular items of interest, others hang it on the refrigerator, or simply save the file, to use as guide to the month, etc. What is most important to know is that we want offer a publication that serves all of you to best, so please bear with us.

What changes are happening now? Much of it has to do with making the Messenger lighter so you can get what you need to know, and what's coming up in a given month without 4-6 pages of things that are always the same and are probably best put elsewhere instead. We will be making those things---say committee lists and general descriptions---available elsewhere through the website or FaceBook pages or in separate documents to be "eblasted" to you a few times a year when an update is justified.

You might have noticed "the week at a glance" appearing on your orders of service? That has been done so that you have a simple calendar of what is happening that week, and at least one side of the insert will include reminders of upcoming programs and fundraisers, to remind you of the many ways to get involved.

We hope you will like what is new about the Messenger and what may be coming next--because you will be part of its ongoing creation. Please drop us a line with your thoughts and ideas!
