Sharing Ministry/ Rev. Michael's Moment: April 2020

What a sad and strange interlude in this world: so many sick, so many scared, more than 33, 000 confirmed dead worldwide as of this writing. The Covid-19 has shown us what other pandemics before have shown: that we are never adequately prepared for such disasters, that supplies of necessary equipment are insufficient, that a large proportion of the population are slow to change their embedded habits--and a smaller percentage refuse to be guided any advice that limits what they see as their liberty. The grandstanding, rancor, unwillingness to cooperate, and limited vision of our own political establishment has only made matters worse, and in this moment, delay is death.

Yet there are hopeful signs among the people. I have heard and read about so many small acts of kindness, of folks reaching out and doing good deeds to help out neighbors and strangers alike. People are frustrated, and regrettably that frustration sometimes leaches out. Yet, huge numbers of ordinary people are also working to change those behaviors, because they know that if there is to be a bright future than it will be up to them; as much as anyone standing at podiums and make speeches, *they* will ensure that future. One kind act at a time is what is needed: 20 seconds of soap and water without skimping, one creative idea that improves a unhealthy situation, a factory rearranged to make critical, higher priority goods, (like facemasks and other medical supplies)---- that is all it takes to make meaningful change. Just call one elderly church member, and say, "How're ya doin?" Remind a child that "it will get better, little by little, if we keep doing what we need to do to be safe."

So, reach out to an old friend or sober buddy, let your loneliness be a signal that others might need a call, email or postcard, too. Sure, keep your physical distance, but be effusive in all the other appropriate ways of showing others that you care about them. All of us are on the front lines now; each of has to fire up our network and keep their morale high. You and I are tasked with modelling life-saving behavior, which includes staying patient, practicing good hygiene and embracing life as it needs to be lived **now**, for <u>now</u>.

Please be diligent about hand-washing, avoiding touching one's face (admittedly a difficult habit to avoid), and avoiding crowds. There is much that can be done to hasten the end of this pandemic and to protect one's self and others. Now is a great time to reflect on our UU principles and on KUUC's mission statement: The people of KUUC are committed to actively creating compassionate community and working for a fair and peaceful world.

KUUC will once again be offering the grade 7-9 component of the <u>Our Whole Lives</u> values*-based lifespan sexuality education curriculum. While this program was jointly developed by the UUA and the UCC, the course as presented at KUUC contains no dogma or religious doctrine, only "accurate, developmentally appropriate information about a range of topics, including

relationships, gender identity, sexual orientation, sexual health, and cultural influences on sexuality." (<u>uua.org/re/owl</u>)

** Due to the pandemic, training for Our Whole Lives leaders has been put off for the immediate future. We will make every effort to get our people trained at the earliest sessions when the resume, although it could delay the start of the program at KUUC.

CIRCLE OF CARING: THERE WHEN YOU NEED THEM:

This is just a little reminder that the KUUC Circle of Caring is a network that does many things to help church members and friends in need: They check in on people who are sick or have been absent from church, sometimes providing rides to the market or medical appointments, or sometimes providing meals on a short-term basis when someone is back from the hospital. These folks are invaluable to the life of our congregation in making sure that the minister is aware of developing pastoral needs, and supporting his work to that end.

Notes on Special Meeting, Sunday Feb. 16 in the Sanctuary. Attendees: 49 members (quorum is 20 % of 145 or 29 members)

The meeting had two items of business:

(1) Approving the Nominating Committee's choice of Jim Peale to replace Matt Aversa as president elect. Carol White spoke on behalf of the Nominating Committee and nominated Jim Peale for President-Elect. The nomination was seconded by Scott Ansevin-Allen. There was no discussion. The motion passed, with all voting to approve except for one abstention.

(2) A presentation from the board of trustees regarding KUUC property ownership and management challenges and options- seeking guidance from the congregation.

John Walter briefly introduced the topic #2. For more background, refer to email 2/4/2020 sent by John Walter titled, "Why Are There Concerns Regarding Church Property?" For informational purposes, Taylor St. has \$37K mortgage remaining. Zillow estimates \$170K market value. Currently, typical attendance at weekly worship service is 50-70 people. Right now, there is no one pursuing the potential for historical grants or funding. There may be a city resource or contact for this. Tom Haynes spoke with a range of ideas:

- Selling the Taylor Street property and building a maintenance fund from the proceeds.
- Liquidating items of potential value: "Truth" window, Revere bell, organ, etc. Proceeds could

be placed into the endowment or into a "maintenance" fund.

• Remodeling the sanctuary for offices and renting the back wing entirely. Sanctuary, parish hall and undercroft could be the new footprint of the church. The remaining space could be used for rental income.

Regarding Taylor St. property, Carol McIntyre-Peale suggested, as part of a sale, we negotiate an easement with the property to retain the driveway. Tom Haynes is meeting with a realtor to discuss valuations and could consider this. Carol did not favor selling our main church property. D'Vorah Kelley suggested creating a false/lowered sanctuary ceiling to save heat.
