January Music Notes "Imagination":



WEREAT BAT!

By now, most of us may have heard that we had a bat flitting about in our main hallway during the last couple of weeks. Rev. Michael was the first to see and report it. Later it was caught and it has been re-homed with a member who wanted a potential bug catcher in their attic.

I met this morning (December 15) with a wildlife expert from our past control service. We did a quick walk through of the common areas of the church. The good news is that we didn't find any more bats. The less good news is that he characterized the building as very, very bat hospitable, primarily because of our slate roof. He said that there are almost certainly more sheltering from the Winter cold as there are a huge number of places where they can gain entry, between the construction of the building and the ability of bats to squeeze through very small cracks.

The expert suggested that people be vigilant for the appearance of any piles of excrement, as bats usually leave that kind of evidence near the places through which they come and go. We have likely had a few bats in occasional residence over the years. The only real remedy would be a comprehensive closing up of the building, which would be quite costly and probably involve an entire rehab of the roof. Bats can't legally be "evicted" during the Winter months as they are a protected species.

COMMUNTY BREAKFAST NEWS

Since its inception in 2012, the Community Breakfast Program has undergone many "makeovers". In the Fall of 2020, it was decided that the Community Kitchen could not be used for food preparation because of COVID-19 restrictions. **P.6**

I wrote to the "Crew Leaders" from the 5 involved Church groups. I thought the response might be" well, maybe we should forget it this year". BUT.....NO....These leaders were committed to this Program and feeding the unsheltered and vulnerable Meetings were organized, plans were discussed, a Base Kitchen was established (thanks to Rev. Michael), supplies were purchased And we were on the way.

Now, every day of the week- Mon thru Fri- a devoted masked crew from a local Church arrives at our kitchen at 6 AM. They wash hands, don gloves, wipe down surfaces, They prepare a variety of breakfast foods: scrambled eggs, pancakes, sausage, French toast, Home fries, ham.

The food is placed into warm serving pans and delivered to the Shelter Resource Center (the Old St James Thrift Shop) in an insulated transporter. There, the staff of the Shelter takes over. They carry the food into the new space and serve it and clean up the pans for return the next day

At the church kitchen, all surfaces are once again wiped with sanitizer solution . The volunteers are usually on their way by 7:30AM.

These acts of kindness are beneficial to all involved .

Zoom frequently, and randomly, publishes updates. Unlike many other apps and programs, your device might not automatically update to the latest version. However, you must be using the latest version in order to see the worship with all the features, like having two speakers appear side-by-side on your screen for responsive readings, or to see the chalice lighting at the same time the words are being said. Even better, the latest update included the possibility of having real-time captioning.

If you use Zoom on a laptop or desktop computer, you want "Zoom desktop client" update. On a smartphone or tablet (like an iPad) choose "Zoom Mobile app" update.
