4th Principle:	A free and responsible search for truth and meaning
5th Principle:	The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large
6th Principle:	The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all
7th Principle:	Respect for the interdependent web of existence of which we are a part

#### THE SIX SOURCES OF OUR LIMING TRADITION

As religious pluralists we draw upon multiple sources of inspiration in worship and daily life including:

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces that create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic people, which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions, which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings, which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings, which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions, which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

# Sharing Ministry/Rev. Michael's Moment: May 2020

"Your assumptions are your windows on the world. Scrub them off every once in a while, or the light won't come in." — Isaac Asimov

It isn't a regular occurrence when I am caught looking the fool because of my assumptions, but it does happen. Usually, when they are off it is either because my assumptions about something--a threshold I should cross, a strategy the Board of Trustees should take, what my children need to do next--are either built on stale ideas, swaddled in the egoic thinking of "the Great I AM", or simply out-of-line with what or where I, or the group I am part of, am prepared to go. Perhaps you have found yourself similarly out-of-step, due to a lack of rigorous questioning of your assumptions, or the fear of being wrong, or the inflexibility of one who is overconfident?

We are in a time when the collective fear, confusion and division in our world is a thick fog that makes it hard to see ones' way clearly. But, I think, as people of this UU tradition of ours, that we have many ways of moving forward, though they are sometimes underutilized. By leaning into our 7 gathering principles, working on the structures and relationships that make us one fine congregation, and by creatively embracing our deceptively simple congregational mission we can move forward boldly.

These tangible things, plus the unsolicited yet perfect opportunity we have been given to adopt, or double down on our spiritual practices (from sitting in meditation and prayer to singing songs we love to practicing our viola) are the things that we can do individually and collectively to scrub the windows of our spirit. It is the work we need to do now--when so much is on hold--so that we may see without distraction, bolster up our congregation, staff and church properties, all for the purpose of personal and societal transformation in the name of Love.

# A Message from your Board President

Hello everyone. I miss seeing you at church, although I have enjoyed seeing many of you at "virtual coffee hour." I am grateful for our virtual services--thanks, Reverend Michael, Donna, David, Carl, Barbara, Susie and Lindsay-but I am looking forward to that day, however distant, when we can meet again in our sanctuary and parish hall rather than in cyberspace. Despite the myriad negative effects of the pandemic, we are fortunate to live in an area of natural beauty, with ample space for "social distancing' in our great outdoors. We are also fortunate to have our **P3** 

church community. I suspect that, like me, you may be reaching out to friends and relatives whom you may not have been in contact with much in recent years. Reaching out personally to church members whom you miss seeing is a great thing to do as well.

The board of trustees just held its first ever virtual meeting. It was somewhat awkward, and not without the usual share of glitches, but we got through the meeting. Not surprisingly, the covid-19 pandemic is posing some financial challenges for KUUC. We are taking in significantly less rental money than budgeted, and our planned Spring yard sale/plant sale cannot be held. Nobody is present at services to offer the collection plate to, and some of us may no longer be able to meet their full pledge for the 2019-2020 church year. The board decided to submit an application for a federal small business Payroll Protection Plan "loan" of approximately \$21,000 -8 weeks' worth of KUUC's payroll and utility expenses. When used for the purpose of maintaining employees' work hours, payment of the loan is forgiven, making this a grant rather than a loan. We barely missed the deadline for the initial plan, but it appears that there will be a successor plan that we are in the pipeline for. About a year ago there was a special meeting in which the congregation gave approval to the board to use up to \$27,000 money from the endowment if needed to pay essential bills. Due to a subsequent successful stewardship drive and due to good rental income and careful budgeting, no such money was needed. However, given the unforeseeable financial repercussions of the covid-19 pandemic, a withdrawal of money from the endowment may be necessary after all.

There are so many people at KUUC doing so many wonderful things that I feel remiss for not thanking them all. Members of the Circle of Caring, co-chaired by Betsy Zimmerli and Betty Forrest, have been doing a wonderful job of reaching out to congregants who have been experiencing hardship, loss, and/or loneliness, Please contact one or both of them if you can help with that essential work. Isn't that what we are here for?
