November Worship Calendar

[Our Soul Matters theme for November is "Healing". Ask yourself: Are we a people who understand the need for healing in our collective life & society? Do we create healing environments when there is suffering, injury and conflict? How has healing happened in my life?]

November 1st: "How to Heal A Country" (The Reverend Michael F. Hall) As we gather on the brink of another election, but surely no ordinary one, we will look at what we will need to fully participate in the election and to carry on after it is all over. Can the country ever heal and the people join together as one?

November 8th: "The Turn to Healing"

There are times when we seem to double down on fighting against pain rather than to turn to healing. Why is that? What does it take to heal? What has been our experience of returning to health of body, mind or spirit? Join us.

November 15th: "Happy, Happy, Happy, Happy Talk" (Rev. Michael)

Is it really advantageous for people to speak positively, avoid unpleasant conversations and refuse to talk about contentious topics? Or are there ways that we might gain greater benefit from encouraging direct engagement, constructive conversation and problem-solving. Also, great music and sharing and more.

November 22nd: "What If We Gave it Away?" (Rev. Michael)

Sometimes we are saved by the kindness of strangers, sometimes by giving away things that matter to us. One of America's foundational stories, that of the Pilgrims of Plymouth and their Indigenous neighbors, involves the giving of gifts and the sharing of a meal. What is left out? Usually the truth and its consequences.

November 29th: "Circling the Turkey" (Antonia Andreoli)

Thanksgiving is past, and yet the emotion and energy of this annual kickoff to the holiday season is as present as the leftovers - and this year carries the heavy burden of uncertainty. Travel experts tell us that in normal times, this is the heaviest travel week of the year - why? Today, let us look beyond the bird, to our drive for reunion and communion with each other.

- Words and deeds of prophetic people, which challenge us to confront powers and structures of
 evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions, which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings, which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings, which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions, which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

You be wondering, is joy the appropriate response to times like these? I think so. I think that we need to find the sources of joy in our lives. Each of us should root around and find true love in our hearts, look for evidence of joy in our spiritual selves, check in the attic, poke around the cellar and the places we hide important things—perhaps gratitude is in the back of the sock drawer? We mustn't give in, we must not isolate, or be satisfied with brooding or feeling powerless: joy, love, celebration, gratitude and wonder are our way out.

I think that joy, love, celebration, a restless imagination, gratitude and wonder are our way out of the dungeon of fear and panic. joy centers us, love braces us and wonder are the resources of resilient people, hopeful and resolute people, people who conceive of new beginnings instead dungeons and fresh hells. People like us.

Mooji, the Jamaican spiritual teacher quoted above is right. We need to remember that the world is beautiful and we are free even as we take up the task of healing what is broken and in need of our care.

The Soul Matters theme for the month of November is *Healing*.

For me, this theme invokes a myriad of possibilities—healing relationships might happen, or not, over a holiday meal; healing social and cultural divisions, might happen, or not, after a bitterly contested election; healing bodily, might happen, or not, after exposure to a little-understood virus; healing spiritually, might happen, or not, after a period of prolonged stress is relieved by rest, reflection and replenishment.

Teresa Honey Youngblood, Family Ministry coordinator for the Soul Matters team, writes:

The best description of healing I ever heard had to do with healing being not a matter of reaching a fixed state called "cured" or "healthy," but rather engaging in a dynamic and multi-faceted process of restoring one's self to a new kind of wholeness.

None of these options represent easy work. Healing, whether in body, mind or spirit, in the metaphorical body politic, or in personal or societal relationships, can be heavy labor. Don't labor alone; join your fellow UUs in one or more of the many ways KUUC and the UUA are fostering community in the coming days.
