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Worship Calendar: October 2019

Our Theme for October is “Belonging.” You may ask yourself: “What does it mean to be a people of BELONGING?”

October 6: “Investing Your Energy” (C. Jacobs, A. Shedd, & Rev. Michael)

There is so much going on at KUUC on any given day. A gang of people readying for the Rummage Sale, a book group getting started, a new beginning for the “Neighboring Faiths” program. Everywhere you turn, committees are planning events, the choir is crooning in the Parish Hall, the Sanctuary being cleaned and prepped for worship. The service will happen at our usual time of 10 o'clock in the Sanctuary and will focus on the benefits of working as a community activity, a way to live our values, to build camaraderie and to provide a vital service to save energy in advance of colder weather to come. We will also share Joys and Concerns as a community. People of all ages are encouraged to attend. *Worship on October 6 will happen in between two periods of work—the details are found elsewhere in this Messenger—so wear your work clothes.*

October 13: “Welcome Home” (Rev. Michael)

Every week we mention that we are a “Welcoming Congregation,” in fact we have been one since April 2003. What does that designation mean? How did we get there? What does it mean to people to LGBTQI+ neighbors and members? What must we do to continue to live up to the principles that make for genuine and inclusive welcoming? The KUUC Choir shares its ministry with us today and there will be a Time for all Ages based on the theme.

October 20th: “The World Will Be a Better Place” (Rev. Michael)

What is the purpose of our lives? Some might say to live a full span of years,

others to follow our bliss, “look out for #1” and enjoy the freedom of being human. Yet other would say that our purpose is to work together to make the world a better, safer, and more just place. Join us today as we explore the plausibility of our 6th UU Principle, “The goal of world community with peace, liberty and justice for all.” There will be a Time for All Ages based on our theme and the adults will share their Joys and Concerns in community.

October 27th: “We Remember Them” (Rev. Michael)

The days between the end of October and the beginning of November are considered by many cultures and faith traditions to be a sacred time; set aside to remember the ancestors and more recently deceased loved ones. Be with us (and them?) this morning as we toll our bells, remembering and sharing stories of our ancestors. The Choir will sing and many stories will be told as part of this special Multigenerational worship service.

Sunday Services begin at 10 A.M. in the Sanctuary followed by Coffee Hour in our Parish Hall.

THE SEVEN UNITARIAN UNIUNIVERSALIST PRINCIPLES

The Principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a covenant made between our Unitarian Universalist congregations. Many of our members use “the Principles” as a guide for how they choose to live their faith at home and in the world.

- 1st Principle:** The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- 2nd Principle:** Justice, equity and compassion in human relations;
- 3rd Principle:** Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- 4th Principle:** A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- 5th Principle:** The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- 6th Principle:** The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- 7th Principle:** Respect for the interdependent web of existence of which we are a part.

THE SIX SOURCES OF OUR LIVING TRADITION

As religious pluralists we draw upon multiple sources of inspiration in worship and daily life including:

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces that create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic people, which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions, which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings, which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings, which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions, which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

SHARING MINISTRY WITH REV. MICHAEL



“Where you belong is where you constantly choose to show up.”

I have a saying. I’m not certain it is my own words or something I heard from another person, but I own it as mine: “The party belongs to those who show up.” I know it isn’t particularly profound, certainly not very eloquent, but it rings true. To have a party, or a church, a movement, or community you need people. You need people to show up, to be where the action is—to make sure that action is happening. Goodness knows, you need people to do the work: carrying out a mission; planning, setting up, and organizing activities; providing entertainment; teaching new steps and making signs. You need people to spread the word and welcome people in the door.

Most people I meet are busy, harried and weary. Many of these folks struggle with feeling that they don’t belong; that they are not needed, noticed, appreciated, consulted, or inspired. I hope that the KUUC we are daily building and rebuilding is a place that leaves people feeling they *are* important to what are doing, that they *do* have something to contribute to this community of compassionate and committed people.

This month we will be thinking about, and working on, what it means to be a people of “Belonging,” which is the Soul Matters theme for October. During the month we will work to make our historic building more energy efficient and will see to it that it is warm when we need it to be warm. We will also begin to discuss the quality and nature of our welcome: how we greet and integrate newcomers and how we help interested friends become full members of the church. We will also begin the process of re-certification as a Welcoming Congregation. Through the “Neighboring Faiths” Religious Exploration program, we will help our youth learn more about other faith traditions by experiencing the people, practices, and worship of those traditions. We will work on one huge “fun”draiser (the Rummage Sale, Oct. 12) while preparing for another (the Greens Sale in December).

Finally, through the month of October we are going to make every effort to live up to our obligations to the Unitarian Universalist Association Annual Program Fund. To do so will require us to pay in excess of \$14,000.00. But before you begin to hyperventilate, know that it is less than \$100 per member, and know that we can make this happen.

So, choose to be here in October. Find a place at KUUC to focus your efforts, a group that is doing things you enjoy to do, attend worship, ask a church friend to coffee, join the choir, teach RE—help out where you can.

Belonging is choosing again and again to show up and being in community with people you admire and enjoy, whose values, activities and aspirations challenge you and bring out your best.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR BOARD PRESIDENT by John Walter

On behalf of the rest of the congregation, I extend a warm welcome to all newcomers to KUUC. I still well remember my first visit to KUUC (and my first experience with Unitarian Universalism) 29 years ago. It was a revelation to find a religion that not only permitted but encouraged questioning. It was also wonderful to find so many kindred (despite our varied spiritual beliefs) spirits. Belonging to this community has been very important to me, and I have met so many wonderful people here over the years.

There are so many people at KUUC donating their time and talent that it can be difficult to give thanks where thanks are due. David Teubner has done an excellent job creating our new KUUC website. Be sure to check it out! Jim Butterfield, our furnace guru, has been working diligently to have our two furnaces running properly and efficiently when heating season begins soon. As our sexton, and in myriad other ways, Betty Forrest continues to do so many things for our church, often alone and behind the scenes.

In October we will be highlighting the important resources and assistance that are provided to us by the Unitarian Universalist Association, of which we are a member. Please check out their website in addition to KUUC’s new website. Through the UUA we are connected to more than 1,000 congregations, giving us a stronger and more diverse voice. The UUA provides invaluable help to our minister and religious exploration director, also to our board of trustees. The UUA cannot provide these needed resources to its member congregations without congregations providing their fair share of financial support to the UUA, and we will be rallying to provide that support.

Announcement from the Board of Trustees

When we contracted with Growing Minds Preschool and Daycare to rent them space in the basement of our church annex, it was with the understanding that they could expand into more space within the basement of our church annex should the need arise. Growing Minds has decided to take that option. The good news is that we are getting approximately 30% more rental income from Growing Minds. The sad news is that, as of November 1, we will no longer have access to the room where our wonderful and educational building blocks are currently housed.

Space has been found for the blocks in the upstairs portion of the annex, in a room that is currently set aside (but rarely used) as a nursery, but the space is much smaller. This represents a painful loss to our Religious Exploration program, especially for the students and teachers. The Board of Trustees is committed to putting most of the substantial additional rental income back into the RE program, which suffered significant cuts in our current budget. We understand that this does not lessen the loss to the blocks program, and we appreciate the RE committee's dedication both to religious education but also to our congregation's overall needs.

Deborah Dunnell deserves particular thanks for establishing and teaching the educational building blocks program and for her willingness to work with the board of trustees to come up with a workable, if less than ideal, solution.

ACTIVISTS CORNER: UPCOMING SOCIAL ACTION OPPORTUNITIES IN THE AREA

Green Sanctuary News: Energy-Saving Worship and Work, Energy Awareness Month, and a UUA Action of Immediate Witness

Were you inspired by the worldwide and local Global Climate Strike on September 20? Here’s a chance to take concrete action: On **Sunday, October 6**, you are invited to arrive at KUUC early (8:30) and/or stay after worship as we gather to button up our beloved building for the coming winter, attending to assorted tasks that should help us cut our fuel use (and our budget!), feel more comfortably draft-free, and live our 7th principle. In the spirit of inclusivity there will be other general tasks and clean-up, or energetic conversation, for those not up to clambering around with vacuums, caulking guns, etc. Worship will be a little abbreviated to allow more time for this exercise in wise and caring stewardship.

The Joy in Showing Up: Creative Movements Supporting Immigrants and our Futures

On Monday, October 14, from 7 to 8:30 PM at the Dublin Community Center, four women will come together to discuss their projects around the immigration crisis, their inspiration for such powerful work and ways that others can participate.

Grace Aldrich will share her upcoming journey, ***Walking with Grace***, and offer opportunities for others to participate in her unfolding practice of humanity inspired by teachers and leaders who have walked as a practice of liberation. Beginning January 1, 2020, Aldrich will travel 1700+ miles from the Widow Jane Cave in Rosendale, NY, to Galveston, TX, ending on Juneteenth Day, visiting different prisons serving as ICE detention centers and meeting with communities along the way, bearing witness, sharing stories and bridging the gap between communities and envisioning a world where everyone belongs and thrives.

Sue Hay will speak about **Project Hope**, a grassroots organization that helps asylum seekers move from detention centers into our communities as they await asylum hearings. A community-based model now forming in the Monadnock Region, they are developing a network of community coalitions to provide housing, legal, medical, educational and other forms of support for at least five asylum-seeking families or individuals.

Marjorie Margolis will speak about an upcoming **Border Awareness Experience (BAE)**, a trip from November 9 to 16 to El Paso, which will provide an opportunity to put a face to the Immigrant, the Refugee, and the Border Patrol Agent. BAE is a program developed by Annunciation House, a nonprofit in El Paso serving the migrant, the homeless and the economically vulnerable since 1978.

Glen Ring, now exhibiting at the Mariposa, will share her firsthand experiences at the Homestead Child Detention Center and discuss the traveling version of the **Uncaged Art** exhibit from teens incarcerated at the Tornillo Detention Center in Texas.

Balmeet Kaur Khalsa will moderate the event. There will be plenty of time for conversation and light refreshments after. For any queries prior to the evening, please contact Balmeet at balmeetkkhalsa@gmail.com.

"Talking About Race: Staying Curious, Moving Forward, and Being Part of the Solution": Monday, October 28 at 6:30 P.M.

This workshop is designed to encourage an open and thoughtful conversation on race, emphasizing how we as a community can learn to appreciate and understand experiences and perspectives different from our own. Facilitated by Allen Davis, an educator and social justice advocate, at the center of the discussion will be the experiences of three local African-American residents, Grace Aldrich, Jim Guy, and Doug Sutherland, and what it means to be an African-American in the U.S. today. Their experiences will be the starting point for our group conversation as the participants examine what they learned and how they can move forward individually and as a community to be even more inclusive and compassionate.

Grace Aldrich is a massage therapist, singer, and storyteller. She became interested in the healing practice of storytelling after performing in the Black Fly Story Hour Series in Peterborough.

Jim Guy moved to New England in 1973 to work as a sales professional. He is semi-retired, a former president of the Monadnock Rotary Club, and he performs volunteer work for local and international organizations.

Doug Sutherland is the executive director of Brantwood Camp in Greenfield, NH. He owns a staff training and team building business that works with camps, businesses, and organizations.
