# Sharing Ministry: September 2020

It is in times like these, when there are too many things happening that we cannot control, and it seems as though the Earth might spin off it its axis—or be knocked off—for all the violence and changes it has endured at our

hands, that we need community such as we find at KUUC. Yet even that has been challenged by the ongoing menace and potential for a rapid uptick in Covid-19 cases with schools about to start up and the increased mobility of people visiting with family and taking late summer vacations.

For this reason, some of us have begun to pine for more time together as a congregation, to worship, work and connect in person. It is understandable and an important acknowledgement of what the church building and congregational life means to you, me, to us. Yet, public safety and our collective health requires us to forego in-person gatherings for now, and at least as concerns large-scale gatherings, for the foreseeable future.

And yet, and yet, we still have each other. So far, the pandemic has not touched our membership, as far as I know, despite the fact that many of us are at risk due to our age or ongoing condition—even though a recent report showed that the highest number of cases by age group in New Hampshire are among those in their 20s, followed by those in their 50s.

I mention these things not to increase our collective anxiety but to reinforce our collective resolve, to do all that we can to stay healthy while not giving in to feelings of loneliness, worry, anger and depression.

Acceptance is needed to move forward together into this new normal so long as it lasts. This is not the end of times, but they sure are curious times, and so we need to remain curious ourselves, and maintain our sense of humor while keeping in touch with each other. Making connections in ways that are comfortable for us: by telephone, handwritten notes, through Zoom meetings and instant messaging, and in-person chats outside, (even though it might mean wearing a mask and keeping at a safe distance) is critical; so that our people remember that we are ever connected and that we care for each other. You are never alone, and as the Hall of Fame baseballer and accidental philosopher, Lawrence P. "Yogi" Berra said about his wife: "We have a good time together, even when we are not together."

To that end, I hope to begin some new ways for us to get together, [see below]. I also want to learn from you what kind of complementary worship, congregational programs and learning opportunities you are interested in and would be willing to do. This time could be transformational if we make the best of it.

We can do this. "We" can do what "I" never can do alone.

# A Message from your Board President September 2020 By Jim Peale

Now we are moving into our first (and, hopefully, last) Autumn of the pandemic. We are lucky to live in an area that has not suffered heavily, though we have suffered. Cases continue to arise in NH and in the Monadnock region. Experts tell us we are still in the "first wave" and neither a vaccine nor an end is in sight, though the next flu season is.

We continue to talk about possibilities for a return to live services but I am not optimistic about this happening before 2021. Anything we do at this point would be severely limited, of necessity and caution, with widely spaced seating, no singing, no coffee hour, and truncated access to facilities. In addition, any services we undertake would have to continue to be available on line in order to be available to as many members as possible.

Our challenge is to remain a spiritual community while we can't be together in the fashion for which we long. There should be opportunities for small groups, through both electronic and live events. Some of these may be educational. Some will be more in the nature of community volunteering. We hope to have a work day or work weekend to do some basic maintenance in the church building. We'd like to have an on line Committee Fair. Please "stay tuned" for notices on those.

Please keep connections you have made in the past alive. A phone call to an acquaintance, a Zoom, a FaceTime, an e-mail, even a letter or postcard (remember those?) are all ways to maintain our relationships when personal meetings aren't possible.

Our daily lives have been disrupted for longer than we probably imagined, back in March, when we took extraordinary measures to protect ourselves, our loved ones, friends and strangers from the spread of a not-yet-understood new virus and the health ravages it causes. We none of us wanted to be here, socially distanced, at the start of a new church year, a new school year, a new season, the eve of a national election—and yet here we are.

With all that in mind, our Religious Exploration offerings will be virtual, and they will be varied.

We will offer a variety of ways to access the support, inspiration, comfort, and community our programs provide. If our modes and methods are working, we'll keep doing them. If not, we'll change. If something doesn't work for you, times, days, recordings, mail, email, whatever, please reach out. If there is something you want to have, please reach out. If you need something, please, reach out. We, your Religious Exploration team, your congregation, your faith community, we are here, and we will respond to your need.

#### RE Ages and Stages

The Soul Matters theme for September is *Renewal*. From Teresa Honey Youngblood, Family Ministry Coordinator for Soul Matters Sharing Circle:

When we embrace renewal, we accept that what worked in the past may not work in the future, and we trade the confidence of experience and mastery for the release, excitement, and opportunity of beginner's mind. That kind of renewal is a gift to our kids and ourselves.

Soul Matters themes will inform KUUC's family RE this year.

- Packets of information, ideas and activities will go out (in the mail or special delivery) to families in the first week of each month.
- On the first Sunday of each month, parents and adult caregivers are invited to a short Zoom meeting with Jill to talk about the theme, the activities and whatever else comes up for us. (let's try 4pm and 30 minutes for the first one. Not a good time? Not a good day? Too short? Let's talk about alternatives!)
- Once per month I will send out a recorded Zoom message for kids and families. Watch whenever it works for you. This message will include some elements from the theme packet, perhaps a story, perhaps a craft, perhaps I'll share some news. Surprise! (for all of us—I'm also just figuring this stuff out as I go.)
- Twice per month we'll have a special "Zoom room" for elementary-age kids (1<sup>st</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> grades) at the Sunday morning coffee hour. Each will be about 20-30 minutes, one just for sharing news and chatting with church friends. The other will include an element or two from the monthly theme as well as time for sharing news.

Once per month we'll have a live Zoom for middle-school age youth, an extension and expansion of last year's in-person *Neighboring Faiths* curriculum, adapted for online. Again, I'm still working this out but I hope there will be a video or documentary that can be viewed at home with family, then online group time to explore themes and connections to Unitarian Universalism. We will be exploring different faiths than last year, so the material will be new for those continuing, and for the new members we will recap past explorations as needed to make connections and extend

understanding. P. 6

• Beginning *next month*, in October, RE will be offering a once-per-month live Zoom for adults on a similar model. A book, movie, or podcast one can experience at home, then come "together" (via the magic of Wi-Fi) to discuss.
